- To Smoke or Not to Smoke -

What field of work are you in?

understand how they are able to better use the they have collected through time to generate new insights and decisions in their operational processes, unlocking new and potential revenue streams, and analyzing customer buying patterns. One of the areas, which I'm focusing on at the moment, is helping a Hong Kong organization better manage their data so that they are able to bring to market new product offerings more quickly.

So how did you start with Golf?

I started playing golf in high school when I was 14. All my friends played and talked about golf so I ended up joining them on the course one day and I instantly fell in love. I remember we were so obsessed that we designed golf courses during economics class.

I started playing at a course called Titirangi Golf Course in Auckland New Zealand. Living in New Zealand, golf was so accessible paying only HK\$1,000 for a junior membership at an Alister Mckenzie designed golf course (the designer of Augusta National Golf Club) where we enjoyed free group coaching from the local pro, and enjoyed set tee times on Sundays.

How would you rate your game?

Going by my last few rounds I'm playing to about a 24 handicap which is way too high for my liking. I would love to get back down to sub 18's. My game is really hot and cold and one of the areas I'm working on is to be more consistent in my golf game.

If I'm able to be consistent I know I'm able to shoot lower.

What has been your best or most memorable game?

My best score was a 79, but for some reason that wasn't a memorable round. My most memorable one was when HKPGS held a golf trip to Vietnam during Christmas last year and we played at Vietnam Country Club. The course was very challenging but was so much fun, as there was overhanging trees, tight fairways, and having to hit golf balls off tree trunks really encouraged you to be innovative in your shot making.

You're such a happy golfer, does anything make you mad on the course?

Nothing really drives me mad on the golf course, as I try to focus on my game and not let others distract me.

Apart from Golf, do you play any other sport?

What other hobbies? There's only one...Golf!

Do you have a favourite brand?

I don't really have a favorite brand of clubs. I just try and use something that works for me. At the moment I feel that golf clubs are very similar from one brand to another and I'm sure that you can find a club that fits your game no matter what brand it is.

However I do like what Taylor Made is doing with the SLDR drivers they are putting out, not just a club for marketing purposes.

It has to be my Odyssey 2 Ball putter, a classic putter which I bought on sale for US\$50 and it has never let me down since. It's the only club that I have stuck with in the last 8 years. The ball just rolls so true off the putter face and it's so easy to align I can't see myself changing that putter any time soon.

Do you have any golf hero?

Probably my friend's dad as he was the one which really got me into golf by taking me to his family golf outings which lasted for 2 weeks and went to play at courses which the NZ Open was held. He was a good player as well, at the time he was on a 5 handicap and was a golf addict recording every single golf tournament that is on cable TV, and bought new clubs every year.

What do you love about golf most?

There are two main reasons I love golf, the first is the technical aspect where it is a lifelong game. You are consistently learning and honing in on your golf game. The second is the social aspect of golf, where I've met some of my best friends out on the golf course.

If you had to use a phrase to describe Golf what would it be?

Awesome.



How did you come to be one of the key members of RGO?

Like most others I came across the group through Meetup.com when I first came to Hong Kong. I brought my clubs over from Australia and wanted to meet some new people while I was out here. So I joined one of the driving range sessions at SCAA, and met Ray, Gilbert, Robin and Amy all in that one session.

After that it just snowed balled from there, going to dinner events held by the members, partied with them in LKF (as you do in HK :P), played a few rounds in China, went on a few golf trips, and before you know it I was organizing Path to the Green sessions, writing golf articles and helping out with the tournaments held by the members.

How would you describe our group to freshers?

The group is young, fun and accepting, no matter what your skill level is. The group really tries to help out other golfers or budding golfers to take up the game. I know in HK the cost of golf, accessibility to golf courses and ability to practice is a big barrier to entry into the game, and for a group to help break some of those barriers is a big positive in my opinion.

What's your goal for golf?

Well I want to try and play more golf, but also help build interest into the game hopefully through the beginner's golfer series, which HKPGS is holding regularly. Even though I'm not a single handicap golfer, I don't feel that you need to be good at golf in order to help nurture interest in the game.

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What's in My Bag

A thrifty approach to golf equipment: When it comes to my golf bag and what's inside it's cheap. I believe I can hit most clubs just fine (feel free to let me borrow yours anytime to see), so I don't worry about getting new ones unless I break the old ones. My rule of thumb is if it's usable then I'll use it.

Irons: I have a 3-iron through a Sand Wedge, but my last few rounds I haven't played with a 4, 6, or 7-iron. I like my bag to be as light as possible, and I'm just not a good enough golfer for every club to matter. I miss my Cleveland 7-iron the most, but I broke it one day years ago, and I guess I didn't try to get it repaired.

Sand wedge: My Dad gave me a sand wedge from a charity golf tournament years ago, and it had served me fine, but when I was practicing at SCAA last year the club head flew off. Then I tried to play 9 Eagles without a sand wedge, which was dumb. I learned my lesson and before my next round at KSC I bought the cheapest Sand Wedge they had. It works fine, but my short game is pretty terrible, which is my fault not the club's fault.

Driver: My Dad gave me this Ping Titanium IST Karsten 10° driver. The club face has come off twice, and the second time it was re-glued the epoxy went from the shaft into the club head, so it has a nice little jingle when I swing it. Also some other part is missing from the club head. The coolest thing about this driver is when I've hit it off of driving range mats it sometimes sparks, which I just find absolutely amusing. I've hit a good handful of shots with this driver off the ground, which is also fun. These days I usually like the safety and additional consistency of my 3-iron over my driver for my par 4 and par 5 tee shots.

5 wood: It's the only Golden Bear club from the original set I have in my Golden Bear bag. It looks well used, but I sometimes don't use it an entire round.

Putter: I use a cheap Spalding putter I took from my parent's garage.

Bag: I got my Golden Bear bag when I got my first set of adult clubs. I think the whole set with the bag was less than \$200USD over 12 years ago. I'd say the bag is semi-functional and is characteristically cheap. It's one of those bags that has the legs that come out, but the problem is they don't stay in, so I have to bend them around the bag to keep them secure.



In my bag pouches: I have 3 golf gloves for some reason. I think at least one doesn't fit very well. I keep tissues, a few tees I've got from wherever, a purple divot remover I can't recall using, whatever the cheapest balls are and whatever balls I find on the course, an energy bar, a pen, and the newest thing in my bag: my golf shoes. My last golf shoes literally fell apart, and I played a back 9 with Ray with a sole that came partially off, and fully came off on the 18th hole.

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The Golfing Garage

- Putting Clinic Part 2: Dialing in Your Pressure Putting -

One of the areas which golfers underestimate in putting is the mental side. Without clarity in your mind and confidence in your putting, it will cause havoc in your putting stroke and it can be the difference between breaking 90 for the first time. Therefore, when you practice putting you should practice with pressure. In the last part of the Putting Clinic, I will provide some pressure putting drills, which I use to help dial in my putting under pressure situations.

Box Drill – Improve your long putting game

The box drill is used to improve your putting game by setting up a box and progressively putting the ball from further and further away, trying to ensure the ball ends up inside the box.



The drill is as follows:

- 1) Set up a box with thin string or tees about 6ft x 10ft with the hole centered in the middle.
- 2) Perform putts at 5, 10, 15, 20, 25 feet .
- 3) Read the line, and putt by keeping head steady and minimize body movement. Make sure the ball lands into the box.
- 4) Start over if the box is missed.
- 5) Repeat drill until all the balls lands into the box.

Circle Drill – Improve your short putting game

The circle drill is used to improve your short putting game by assessing the putt and hitting 8 balls in quick succession. This drill will ensure that you develop short putt accuracy and to putt well under pressure, which in the case of this drill is time.



The drill is as follows:

- 1) Set up 8 balls in a three-foot circle around a hole.
- 2) Putt the ball within five seconds after assessing the break
- 3) Start drill over if ball is missed.
- 4) Repeat drill until all putts are made.

Nine Hole Par 2 - Pressure putting under a game situation

The aim of the game is to put your putting under pressure by playing a nine hole putting challenge where each miss will have consequences. The drill is the as follows:

- 1) Start 6ft from the hole and try to hole that putt.
- 2) If you hole it, you move on to the next hole (9 holes in total).
- 3) If you miss it, move the ball back from where it finished by one club length and repeat the process.
- 4) Consider each hole a par 2 and total your score for the nine holes.
- 5) Try to beat your best score each time.

Make the Hole look Bigger on the Course – Gain confidence

The aim of the game is to gain extra confidence on the golf course by making the hole seem bigger than it is. This is a good one to try before you go out on the golf course as the hole will seem twice as big giving you more confidence over shorter putts. Here's what you do:

- 1) Put 2 tees in the ground just in front of the hole, so they make the hole about half its actual width.
- 2) Try to make 5 putts from 4ft.
- 3) If you miss start over.

Now that you have several putting drills and games under your belt, take some time to practice your putting under pressure scenarios and hopefully it provide clarity in your mind and most importantly develop confidence in your putting stroke next time you are on the course. ♣
